## COMMITTEE REPORTS

- **Public Safety and Health Committee:** Had a meeting this morning, Director Clinkscale was in attendance. She described Lyndhurst and Shaker Heights programs for sidewalk repair; Director Clinkscale advised that the CH Public Works Department does not have the capacity to run a program in house, and budgeting is a large concern. Another concern is that an assessment for sidewalk repairs might push a property owner into delinquency on their taxes. At this point, she is recommending not to proceed with the sidewalk repair program. Councilman Cuda suggested using ARPA funds to fund a pilot program. This committee will continue to discuss funded legislation to fix city sidewalks. Regarding sidewalk snow removal, FutureHeights has reported they do not have the staffing to coordinate this program. Councilman Cuda suggested reaching out to local

churches. Mayor and the Principal of Noble School have continued discussion regarding traffic during pick up/drop off.

- **Community Relations and Recreation Committee:** The Commission on Aging had their monthly meeting and minutes will be out for public review soon. Parks and Recs Advisory Board will meet tomorrow at 6:30pm at the Community Center. Women Out Walking registration starts April 7, 2023, first 125 women will get a t-shirt; program is from May 7—September 3. Kick off event is May 7 from 2pm-3pm.

ORDINANCE NO. 047-2023(F), *First Reading*

By Mayor Seren

An ordinance to amend certain subparagraphs of Ordinance No. 168-2022, relating to appropriations and other expenditures of the City of Cleveland Heights, Ohio for the fiscal year ending December 31, 2023 and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Cleveland Heights that:

SECTION 1. Certain subparagraphs of Ordinance No. 168-2022 relating to appropriations for the current expenses and other expenditures of the City of Cleveland Heights, Ohio for the fiscal year ending December 31, 2023 be, and the same hereby are increased, decreased and/or transferred in the amounts set forth in Exhibit 1.

SECTION 2. All expenditures of the City of Cleveland Heights within the fiscal year ending December 31, 2023, shall be made within the appropriations herein provided. "Appropriation" as used herein means the total amount appropriated for the individual fund. Notwithstanding the financial detail herein presented within an individual fund, the Mayor is authorized to transfer budgeted amounts within each fund, so long as the total amount appropriated for each individual fund is not exceeded.

SECTION 3. Notice of the passage of this ordinance shall be given by publishing the title and abstract of contents, prepared by the Director of Law, once in one paper of general circulation in the City of Cleveland Heights.

SECTION 4. This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure immediately necessary for the preservation of public peace, health, and safety of the inhabitants of the City of Cleveland Heights, such emergency being the ongoing and continuous need to preserve the faith and credit of the City. Wherefore, provided it receives the affirmative vote of five (5) or more of the members elected or appointed to this Council, this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage; otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest time allowed by law.

**ORDINANCE NO. 048-2023(PD)**

An Ordinance authorizing the Mayor to convey an easement to the Cleveland Electric Illuminating Company for the relocation of power lines as part of the Cedar Lee Meadowbrook Development; and declaring the necessity that this legislation become immediately effective as an emergency measure.

**SECTION 1.** The Mayor be, and he is hereby, authorized execute an easement to convey a portion of PPN 687-08-001, which is City-owned property fronting on Meadowbrook Boulevard. The easement shall be for the purpose of relocation of electric lines, and shall be located as shown in Exhibit A attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. The easement shall contain such other terms as recommended by the Mayor and Director of Law and shall be approved as to form by the Director of Law.

**SECTION 2.** This Council hereby determines that the easement authorized herein does not interfere with the use of the City-owned property for public purposes.

**SECTION 3.** Notice of the passage of this Ordinance shall be given by publishing the title and abstract of its contents, prepared by the Director of Law, once in one newspaper of general circulation in the City of Cleveland Heights.

**SECTION 4.** This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety of the inhabitants of the City of Cleveland Heights, such emergency being the need to meet CEI deadlines so that the Cedar Lee Meadowbrook Project is not delayed. Therefore, provided it receives the affirmative vote of five (5) or more of the members elected or appointed to this Council, this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage; otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest time allowed by law.







- a. The Political Subdivision hereby agrees to be bound by all terms and conditions established by ODOT in the road salt contract and acknowledges that upon of award of the contract by the Director of ODOT it shall be bound by all such terms and conditions included in the contract; and
- b. The Political Subdivision hereby acknowledges that upon the Director of ODOT’s signing of the road salt contract, it shall effectively form a contract between the awarded salt supplier and the Political Subdivision; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 723.05, where in the opinion of the legislative authority, there is good cause for vacating a public road, and such vacation will not be detrimental to the general interest, the legislative authority may by ordinance and without petition therefor, vacate such road; and

Beyer 2006 Restatement Of Living Trust Agreement dated February 6, 1991 ("Parkwood Trustee"), and the City desires a written agreement among both adjoining owners to the Road Portion and the City to accomplish this non-standard split and consolidations.

SECTION 5. WHEREAS, the League of American Bicyclists have recognized Cleveland Heights as a bronze award-level Bicycle Friendly Community since 2013; and

WHEREAS, Cleveland Heights continues to assess its transportation network and connections to other cities and seek grants for projects that improve the safety and comfort of bicyclists, such as the Cedar Glen Trail that connects Cedar Fairmount to University Circle and the Lake-to-Lakes Trail; and

It is necessary that this Resolution become immediately effective as an emergency measure necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety of the inhabitants of the City of Cleveland Heights, such emergency being the need to join with the other communities in this celebration and the need to proclaim *Mary Dunbar Bike Month* and related events on a timely basis. Wherefore, provided it receives the affirmative vote of five or more of the members elected or appointed to this Council, this Resolution shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage; otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest time allowed by law.
