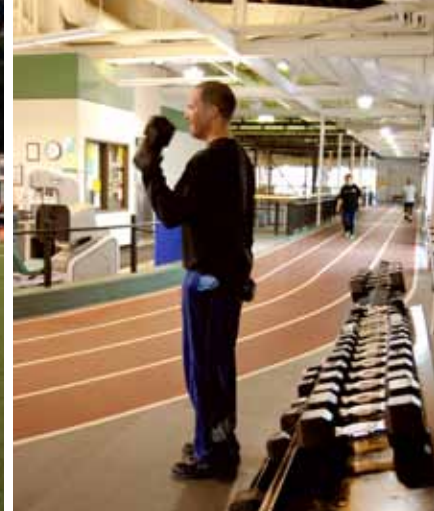

Meet Your Police

Update from Planning and Development

Green Zoning Project

Camiros planning consultants has drafted suggested zoning code amendments based on recommendations from their Sustainability Audit of the City’s Zoning Ordinance. This draft code is currently being reviewed to understand the costs and benefits to individual properties, neighborhoods and the community as a whole. Camiros will insert definitions, standards, diagrams and cross references and City Council would introduce the amended zoning code as an ordinance and hold a public hearing on the proposed regulations. The Planning Commission would review it and again provide the public with an opportunity to comment. Following receipt of the Planning Commission’s recommendations, the amendment returns to City Council for final approval.

To promote economic development and adaptive reuse of vacant institutional buildings in our residential neighborhoods, one recommendation from the Sustainability Audit has been moved forward. An amendment to the zoning code that would establish standards to conditionally permit the adaptive reuse of nonresidential structures located in residential districts has been moving through the established zoning code amendment process. The Adaptive Reuse Ordinance No. 74-2011 and the entire Sustainability Audit are available on the City’s webpage.

Cumberland Pool Parking Lot

The EPA-funded storm water improvement demonstration project creating landscaped basins in the parking lot has been easily handling the exceptionally heavy rainfalls this summer. The parking lot storm water flows into the retention areas where Brown Eyed Susan, Winterberry, Switch Grass and Red Maples will absorb much of the water. The remaining storm water filters through special layers of soil and gravel before reaching a drainpipe or flowing deeper into the aquifer (water-

filled rock layers). Upon inspection, Ohio EPA staff was so pleased that they will be including the Cumberland parking lot upon their return in September with national EPA staff.

Solar Bus Shelters

Solar bus shelters arrived just in time to be part of the “Missing Links” Transportation for Livable Communities Initiative planning study funded by the Northeast Ohio Areawide Coordinating Agency. The City, with the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Agency as co-sponsor will study ways to improve pedestrian and bus connections between University Circle and Cleveland Heights. The goal of the study is to encourage drivers to become pedestrians or bus riders. The solar shelters provide an attractive and distinct bus-waiting environment powered by clean, renewable energy.

Bicycle Planning

Sharrows, symbols painted on portions of Euclid Heights Boulevard, Edgehill Road and, most recently, Lee Road from Superior to Mayfield, express the City’s desire that motorists and bicyclists share the road. Expect more bike-friendly projects happening later this year, too! Concurrently with the Missing Links bus rider and pedestrian study, a University Circle - Cleveland Heights Bicycle Network study is underway to increase bike ridership between University Circle and Cleveland Heights. Bike riding is a health-conscious, affordable and ecological way to travel and the City wants to capitalize on our proximity to University Circle.

Economic Development

The City of Cleveland Heights has engaged SGI Global Business Advisors LLC to explore opportunities to expand economic development activities in the city. The initial focus for this effort will be to build a “cluster” of security technology-related businesses and initiatives. While clusters have been established in the biomedical and aerospace industries in the Cleveland area, there have been no efforts in the region or Midwest to

develop a cluster-driven strategy focused on security-related initiatives. For more information on this project, contact Howard Thompson, Economic Development Director at 216-291-4857 or hthompson@clvhts.com.

Down Payment Assistance Program

The City of Cleveland Heights has assistance available for eligible home buyers through the Down Payment Assistant Program. The program offers up to \$10,000 down payment assistance for a single-family home and \$10,000 down payment assistance for a two-family home in the form of a deferred payment, zero (0%) interest second mortgage. The loan is to be repaid immediately at the time of resale, transfer, or if the property becomes absentee-owned.

In addition, the program offers up to \$20,000 in down payment assistance for a housing unit in the BlueStone Development’s Loft Building, and up to \$20,000 in down payment assistance for a housing unit in the East Derbyshire Project. This is a loan that is forgiven at the rate of 1/60th per month of ownership and occupancy beginning in the 6th year and ending in the 10th year of owner occupancy. This loan is secured by a second mortgage on the property.

Eligible Applicants

Applicant(s) must be at or below the following income guidelines for their household size: 1) \$ 35,200, 2) \$ 40,200, 3) \$ 45,250, 4) \$ 50,250, 5) \$ 54,300, 6) \$ 58,300. Trick-or-Treating Safety Tips

- To ensure safety, a parent or guardian should accompany young children on neighborhood rounds.
- For additional safety, carry a flashlight.
- Make sure costumes are safe, fire proof and with eye holes (if wearing masks) large enough to allow good peripheral vision.
- Only go to houses with porch lights on and never enter the home of a stranger.
- No treats should be eaten until they are thoroughly checked by an adult at home.
- Never consume unwrapped food items or open beverages that may be offered.
- For those distributing candy, eliminate tripping hazards on your porch and walkway. Check for flowerpots, low tree limbs, support wires or garden hoses.
- **Also, if you plan on distributing candy, make sure your porch light is on.**

Thomas F. Patton II Memorial Highway

The State of Ohio has named a stretch of State Route 322 (Mayfield Road) "Officer Thomas F. Patton II Memorial Highway." Cleveland Heights Police Officer Thomas Patton died in March 2010 of a cardiac incident while in pursuit of a suspect. He had been a member of the Cleveland Heights Police Department for nine years.

Governor John Kasich joined Officer Patton's family, friends and fellow police officers in dedicating the highway and unveiling a sign. A similar tribute to Officer Jason West is also planned.

NSP Update

Neighborhood

Stabilization Program (NSP)

NSP 1 was funded under the Housing Economic Recovery Act (HERA) of 2008. Cleveland Heights received funding through the Ohio Department of Development. The program is designed to stabilize neighborhoods by rehabilitating homes for new owner occupants and to remove blighted properties. While rehabilitating these properties to bring them up to housing code, the Housing Preservation Office staff also incorporated many energy saving elements.

Cleveland Heights has renovated 12 single-family homes that had been vacant, abandoned and/or foreclosed. Six of these rehabilitated houses have sold to owner occupants. The City is also working with the County Landbank for the demolition of houses that cannot be renovated.

The City invited the community to a NSP Open House on August 28 to tour the remaining six houses and see these homes and to learn more about the Neighborhood Stabilization Program. These homes are listed with local real estate agents. NSP regulations require purchasers to meet certain requirements. Collection of Loose Leaves

Autumn is here in our “city of trees” and it’s time for raking and/or blowing the leaves. **Loose-leaf collection will begin on Monday, October 31 and will continue until Friday, December 2, weather permitting.** It is our intention to collect loose leaves from each property once every other week on your regularly scheduled refuse collection day. However, if one day’s collection is light or another day’s is heavy, collection may be made on a different day. Saturday leaf collection (if needed) will be used to return to heavy areas or to make up for holidays or bad weather. If your leaves are not collected on your refuse collection day, we ask that you please be patient.

Prior to October 31 and after December 2, leaves **will be collected only when placed in paper lawn bags.** Leaves and yard waste **will not** be collected in plastic bags. Paper lawn bags are available at the cashier’s counter at City Hall, the Community Center or at most local stores.

If snow falls during the loose-leaf collection season, it becomes nearly impossible to maintain the collection schedule. The same workers and many of the same vehicles collecting leaves are used for snow and ice control.

Preparing the Leaves for Collection

- Leaves placed in paper lawn bags will always be collected on your regular refuse collection day. Bags should be placed on your tree lawn no earlier than 7:00 pm the evening before the day of your collection or after 7:00 am on the collection day.
- During the weeks designated for loose leaf collection – **Monday, October 31 until Friday, December 2** – rake or blow your leaves to the tree lawn.
- **DO NOT RAKE LEAVES INTO THE STREET** where they become a safety hazard or block storm drains.
- It is **ILLEGAL TO BURN LEAVES** in the City of Cleveland Heights.

- Brush, tree and hedge trimmings must be cut and tied into bundles no larger than four feet in length and two feet in diameter in order to be collected on your regularly scheduled trash pickup day. Brush that is too large to be tied into bundles can be picked up for an additional charge; arrangements must be made in advance – call **216-691-7300**.

Use caution when approaching the leaf vacuum machines or the front-end loader. These vehicles back up frequently and may block the lane of travel. Please drive slowly and cautiously in these areas. **Also, while playing in big piles of leaves may be fun, please keep small children and pets away from leaf piles near the street at all times to avoid an accident!**

Recycling: A Cleveland Heights Way of Life

Cleveland Heights is among the top 10 recycling communities in Cuyahoga County, recycling more than 53% of its solid waste in 2010, according to Cuyahoga County’s 2010 Residential Recycling Report. The report states that in 2010, residential recycling programs in the county:

- Diverted 203,847 tons of solid waste from landfills
 - Recovered 27.94% of all household waste for recycling
 - Saved 7,693 tons of nonrenewable natural resources
 - Conserved 741,402 trees
 - Saved over 1,137,449 million Btus of energy, enough to power 11,262 homes for one year
 - Reduced air emissions by 81,321 tons
- The City of Cleveland Heights is proud to have been a part those accomplishments. While diverting 53.16% of solid waste is an improvement over 2009, we, as a community, can do even better! We thank those residents who faithfully recycle every week and encourage those who have yet to get started!

Here are a few recycling reminders:

Please recycle paper products:

- Newspaper
- Catalogs, magazines, glossy ad inserts
- Office, computer, school paper
- Shredded canceled checks, junk mail, shredded paper. Shredded paper can be placed in paper bags (regular grocery bags or Kraft bags) or, if needed, plastic bags. However, regardless of the manner packaged, you must securely close the bag (tie, tape, etc.) and indicate in large letters on the bag “SHREDDED PAPER” and place it near the other recycling. This way the paper will not get blown around the neighborhood on windy days and will not be mistaken for yard waste or garbage by the collector.
- Books – including phone books, paperbacks
- Corrugated cardboard
- Boxboard cardboard (cereal boxes, pop cartons, etc.)
- Gift, shoe, and toy boxes
- Greeting cards, giftwrap (no foil)

All paper may be co-mingled; that is, placed in the same paper bag or small cardboard container (corrugated boxes, food item boxes, such as cereal boxes or soft drink cartons). If using paper bags, pack tightly. Cardboard, newspaper, junk mail, magazines, etc. may also be bundled with string (no tape or wire).

Please recycle glass, metal and plastic containers:

- Glass bottles and jars
- Food and beverage cans, metal lids
- Plastic bottles and containers #1-#5 and #7. This includes, but is not limited to:
 - Items such as plastic soft drink, water, sports drink, mouthwash, peanut butter, pickle, jelly, etc. containers.
 - Milk, water, shampoo, dish and laundry detergent bottles; yogurt and margarine tubs, grocery, trash and retail bags
 - Clear food and non-food packaging
 - Dry cleaning, bread and frozen food bags, squeezable bottles (honey, mustard, etc.)
 - Ketchup bottles, medicine bottles, oven/microwave prepared food trays

- Three and five-gallon reusable water bottles.

All these items may be recycled together in the same see-through (clear or blue) recycling bag. Place the bag on your tree lawn on your regular collection day, a few feet away from your trash.

Also recyclable:

- Car batteries
- Used motor oil
- Computers and accessories, including monitors, keyboards, mice, printers, terminals, modems and software. The equipment will be collected curbside or by special prearranged pickups.
- Computer ink cartridges (may be dropped off at City Hall or the service garage)
- Technotrash - Safely recycle items that may contain personal information: old CDs, DVDs, diskettes, audio and video tapes, cell phones, pagers, PDAs, digital cameras, and rechargeable batteries. Bring them to the Technotrash containers located in the Cleveland Heights City Hall atrium and at the Community Center. Using this recycling service guarantees complete security and keeps the material out of landfills.

Refuse/Recycling Procedures

- All refuse, recycling and yard waste material **must be on the tree lawn by 7:00 am on the collection day.**
- **An additional charge will be assessed for the collection of later material, or the material must be removed from the tree lawn and placed back on the residents property until the following week.**
- Refuse left out on non-collection days may be cited by the Housing Inspection Department.
- **A fee will be issued for the collection of brush, tree trimmings, etc. that**

is NOT TIED in bundles no larger than four feet in length and three feet in width. The loose brush may not be collected on your regular collection day, but as the availability of the equipment allows.

Hey! Why Didn't My Trash Get Picked Up?

There could be several reasons:

- **It was not out by 7:00 am.** (All refuse and yard waste must be out by 7:00 am.)
- **The bags were too heavy.** (Bags cannot weigh more than 40 pounds.)
- **Yard waste was placed in plastic bags.** (All yard waste must be in paper Kraft bags.)
- **Refuse was in the wrong container.** (All refuse must be in securely tied **plastic bags – no garbage cans permitted.**)
- You had mixed trash. (Yard waste and garbage may not be mixed together.)
- Animal waste! (Please double-bag the waste and put it in a black (preferably) garbage bag securely tied along with your waste.)
- Tree branches were left. (Branches are to be no longer than four feet in length and

two feet in diameter and tied – no wire.)

- **Carpeting** (Must be rolled and tied no longer than four feet in length and not weighing more than 50 pounds per bundle.)
- **Paint (Latex paint must be dried to be collected.** Kitty litter or a product available at home improvement stores can be used. Once the paint is solid, place the can with the lid off with your refuse. **Oil-based paint** should be placed away from your refuse and will be collected for recycling.)

Christmas Tree Collection

The Christmas tree collection/recycling program offers residents an easy and environmentally sensitive way to dispose of live trees. To prepare the tree for collection and for the safety of our employees, all decorations, tinsel, wire, nails, stands and bags must be removed from the tree. Trees in plastic bags or flocked trees cannot be recycled. **Live tree collection will begin on December 27 and continue through January 29, 2012.**

HOLIDAY COLLECTION SCHEDULE

- **Columbus Day, Monday, October 10, is NOT a City holiday.** The regular Monday-Friday collection remains in force.
- **Veterans Day – Friday, November 11:** Both Thursday and Friday routes will be collected on Thursday.
- **Thanksgiving Day – Thursday, November 24:** Monday-Wednesday routes will be collected as usual. Thursday & Friday collection will be delayed by one day: Thursday to Friday and Friday to Saturday.
- **Christmas Observance – Monday, December 26:** Refuse collection will be delayed by one day following the holiday. Monday's refuse will be collected Tuesday, Tuesday's on Wednesday, etc. Friday's collection will remain the same.
- **New Year's Day Observance, Monday, January 2:** Refuse collection will be delayed by one day following the holiday. Monday's refuse will be collected Tuesday, Tuesday's on Wednesday, etc. Friday's collection will remain the same.

Recreation

Recreation ID Cards

ID cards, sold to Cleveland Heights residents only, are \$5.00 each and include a digital photo (similar to a driver's license). Each individual must be present to receive a card. Proof of residency must be shown at the time of purchase and can include two utility bills (or other pieces of mail), in addition to a driver's license or photo I.D. Benefits of having a Recreation I.D. card include:

- free use of our lighted tennis courts, our outdoor basketball courts and our skate park;
- use of six outdoor picnic shelters (permit reservations are \$25); free use of the Cumberland wading pool;
- reduced rates for all Community Center classes, workshops, programs and field trips;
- reduced admission for swimming and aquatic programs;
- reduced rates for public ice skating sessions and other skating programs;
- reduced rates for tennis lessons and for youth/adults sports programs;
- use of our Community Center track, fitness center and basketball courts (with a Recreation I.D. card, you may purchase a Community Center Field House pass or pay a daily \$6.00 usage fee for the Field House.)

Fall is a busy and exciting time as our recreation and sports programs for both children and adults are underway! The Fall/Winter Parks and Recreation catalogue was mailed in August, but if you've misplaced your copy, it's also available on the City's website, www.clevelandheights.com.

General Recreation Classes

New this season is **Hula-Hooping Fun & Fit** for residents ages 16 and up. It's a fun workout that integrates dance and movement with weighted hula hoops that will tone the major muscle groups, burn calories and leave you feeling happy and energized. **Tribal Belly Dance** classes will help you improve flexibility, strength and grace while teaching you to move muscles in a new way. Are you ready to **Zumba**? Learn Latin dance steps in a cardio-interval format while enjoying the Latin rhythms, including merengue, salsa, cumbia, flamenco. Maybe you want to slow down and reduce the effects of stress with **Yoga**. Consider signing up for these and other exciting classes!

Cleveland Heights also offers a variety of programs and classes for kids of all ages from **Ballet** and **Tumbling** to **Self-Defense/Karate** and **Mini Kids Kuk Sool Won** (Traditional Korean Martial Arts). - **Youth Soccer League** is for girls and boys in Kindergarten-grade 6. All games are played on the new artificial turf at Denison Park.
- **Flag Football** is also underway for boys and girls ages 5-8. All games are played on the new artificial turf at Denison Park.
- **The Basketball Recreational League** registration is underway for boys and girls in grades K-8 who are Cleveland Heights residents or live within the boundaries of the Cleveland Heights-University Heights School District. **Volunteer coaches are needed; call 216-691-7373.**

Help For Homeowners

Home Repair Resource Center Works to Connect with Residents

In recent months, the board and staff of Home Repair Resource Center (HRRC) have been revamping its services to make them more relevant and more accessible to residents. Tool loan hours have been changed to make borrowing and returning tools easier for people who work. The schedule of hands-on repair workshops is being expanded with volunteer instructors. Changes are also pending in the loans and grants available through HRRC's Financial Assistance Program (details will be announced when finalized). Finally, HRRC is partnering with the Cleveland Heights-University Heights Public Library to make their resources (handouts and videos) more widely available to the community.

Cleveland Heights homeowners are urged to contact HRRC with ideas about how its services might better serve them. Heritage Home Program Assists with Home Maintenance

The Heritage Home Program is a unique home repair program for owners of older and historic homes that are 50 years old and older. It was developed in order to give homeowners of older or historic homes the right tools in order to maintain their houses and neighborhoods. Sponsored by Cuyahoga County, the Ohio Treasurer, and the Ohio Housing Finance Agency, the Cleveland Restoration Society administers the Heritage Home Program offering technical assistance and low fixed-interest financing to owners of one- to three-unit residential properties in need of maintenance. The free technical advice component of the Heritage Program is what sets it apart from other programs of its kind. Now you can have the help and answers you need in order to get the project done properly. Just ask the old house experts!

Generally, to be eligible for the program, the house must be: • 50 years old or older • three units or less • zoned as a residential property and • must not have synthetic siding, or if it does, removal of the siding must be part of the project's scope.

The Heritage staff provides in-depth assistance to homeowners via site visits, custom construction specifications, historic color consults, and support materials. Homeowners can take advantage of either the free consulting services or use the low fixed interest rate, seven- to ten-year term rehabilitation loan to fund a large variety of interior and exterior home maintenance and improvement projects. Examples of types of projects include roof replacement, addressing city violations, exterior paint renovation, porch repairs, new insulation, new furnace, and interior renovations.

CRS' team of historic rehabilitation specialists can answer your questions about the proper repair and maintenance of your older home at no charge. If you are interested in finding out more information on the program, or to see if your house qualifies, contact the Cleveland Restoration Society at **216-426-3106**.

Shaker Farm Historic District on the way to becoming City's 10th National Register Historic District

The Ohio Historic Preservation Office is scheduled to hold a public hearing on September 27 on the proposed listing of the Shaker Farm Historic District on the National Register of Historic Places. On November 4 in Columbus, the Ohio Historic Sites Advisory Board will review the nomination and make their recommendation to the Secretary of the Interior. It is anticipated that the Shaker Farm Historic District will be listed on the National Register in early 2012.

The Shaker Farm Historic District is an early twentieth-century suburban residential development of approximately 266 acres, first laid out in 1904. The District occupies the northern section of 1,393 acres owned by the North Union Shaker Colony between 1822 and 1892 and predates the development of today's Shaker Heights. (See map below)

Like many other Cleveland Heights neighborhoods, the development followed the romantic suburban design

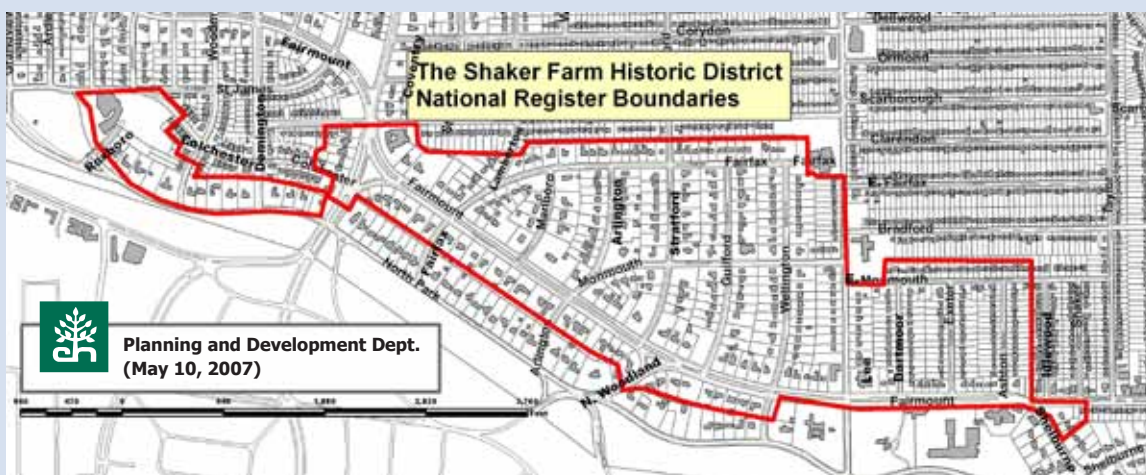
prevalent at that time, favoring winding streets over more traditionally designed gridded streets and targeted the Cleveland elite's desire to get away from the industrialized city center. The area was very rural and real estate advertising promoted "the benefits and delights of living in the country," including "fresh air, pure water and spacious surroundings" and "the fragrance of nature's wild flowers."

All the homes in the district are designed for single-family occupancy and many were constructed with space for live-in servants, including the upper story of carriage houses, rooms above attached garages, servants' wings, and rooms on third floors.

High quality materials were used, with many homes constructed of brick, stone and stucco and others using clapboard and wood shingles. Unlike many developments of this time, a high percentage of the homes were architect designed, with attention to style, detail and amenities. The District's houses reflect the eclecticism prevalent in early twentieth-century domestic architecture. Domi-

nant architectural styles are the Colonial Revival, Medieval Revival and Picturesque, though as was common, many are eclectic blends of popular styles.

Like districts before it, National Register listing acknowledges the architectural, historic and planning importance of yet another Cleveland Heights neighborhood. National Register listing is a time-consuming process, often undertaken by consultants. In Cleveland Heights, we've been lucky enough to have many active and dedicated residents complete nominations with assistance from the City's Historic Preservation Planner. Cleveland Heights resident Mary Dunbar spent the last two years researching her neighborhood and completing a detailed nomination form in order to get yet another Cleveland Heights neighborhood the recognition it deserves. With 10 National Register Historic District listings, Cleveland Heights becomes one of only a handful of communities in the state with so many historic neighborhoods recognized.

Pathways of Choice

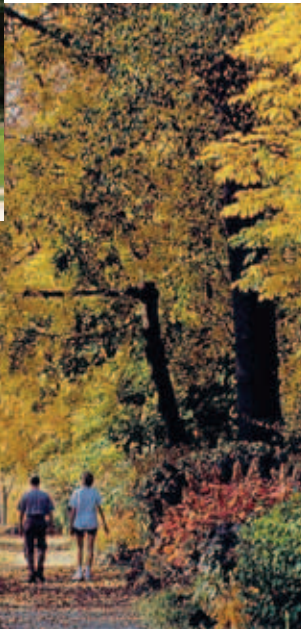
