

CITY BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

Architecture Review Board

The Architectural Board of Review protects properties on which buildings or structures are constructed or altered, maintains the high character of community development, and protects real estate from impairment or destruction of value. They accomplish this by regulating according to proper architectural principles the design, use of materials, finished grade lines and orientation of the reviewed projects. Adjacent property owners are provided notice of the meeting for their information and comments.

Board of Control

The Board of Control administers the zoning ordinance regulations in the S-1 Mixed Use District.

Board of Zoning Appeals

This board hears citizen requests for zoning variances from regulations pertaining to signs, yard regulations, lot width requirements, off-street parking requirements, fences, etc. The board hears appeals concerning Housing, Zoning and Business Maintenance Codes.

Charter Review Commission

The Charter Review Commission completed its prescribed mission to review the entire charter of the City of Cleveland Heights in February 2019.

Citizens Advisory Committee

The committee provides a means for the community to obtain information on the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, assists in the evaluation and preparation of the CDBG yearly application, participates in monitoring the implementation of the CDBG program, and reviews the City's annual CDBG budget.

Civil Service Commission

The commission prepares and administers tests for hiring and promoting civil service employees in the police and fire divisions.

Commission on Aging

The Commission on Aging's purpose is to serve in an advisory capacity to Council on concerns of the aging and to recommend programs for the aging and means of implementing such programs.

Fair Practices Board

This board investigates and settles complaints of discriminatory practices in a housing, employment, education, and public accommodation context, and

to prohibit "blockbusting" and other similar real estate practices which limit housing options and result in the destabilization of communities, a decline in property values, and/or the segregation or re-segregation of neighborhoods.

Landmark Commission

The Landmark Commission, in accordance with the goals of the 2017 Cleveland Heights Master Plan, permits the City to protect and enhance the historic and aesthetic qualities of the City for the enjoyment of the City's residents and visitors alike. The ordinance furthers historic preservation goals by enabling the Landmark Commission to safeguard locally designated historic properties, protect properties as they go through the historic district designation process, permit the Landmark Commission to designate local historic districts where more than 50% of property owners consent, and protect designated properties from inappropriate alterations or demolition by requiring Landmark Commission approval.

Planning Commission

They make recommendations to Council and the City Manager on matters affecting the physical development of the City.

Recreation Advisory Board

This board acts in an advisory and consultative capacity to Council in the area of recreation.

Transportation Advisory Committee

The Transportation Advisory Committee brings together citizens and officials responsible for transportation projects to share ideas about Cleveland Heights transportation projects, policies and practices, and will make recommendations on transportation issues and programs to City Council at least annually. The Committee serves as a civic forum dedicated to improving conditions for walking, bicycling and riding transit for residents of all ages and abilities, and to finding optimal solutions for transportation issues facing the City.

CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION AT ANNUAL SAFETY FORCES NIGHT OUT

Join friends, neighbors, City staff, and Cleveland Heights Police and Fire departments at the annual Safety Forces Night out on Tuesday, August 3 from 6:00 to 9:00pm. And this year will be extra special as we will also be celebrating Cleveland Heights' Centennial with more activities including the six-foot tall Anniversary Card for celebrants to sign and collecting items for the 100-year time capsule.

Participants will be able to meet the police and get a close-up view of police vehicles. Fire personnel will have fire trucks and ambulances on site. Children will learn about bike safety and maintenance, register their bikes, hear about gun safety, and can have their fingerprints taken.

The K-9 Unit will also be in attendance: the dogs are trained to detect drugs, do building searches, and track for suspects or lost children and adults. There will also be demonstrations by the Police Swat Team and the Bomb Squad Robot.

BULK PICK-UP

Bulk items will be picked up once per month during the **first FULL week of each month** on the resident's regular trash day; a full week is defined as Monday through Friday (weeks of July 5, August 2, and September 6). Bulk is limited to four (4) items per pick-up and any fabric item must be wrapped in plastic. If there are more than four items or if the bulk pick-up needs to occur on a day that is different than the regularly scheduled day, please call 216-291-5995 to schedule a special pick-up; there is an additional fee. **MOVE OUTS AND CONSTRUCTION MATERIAL WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.** For details about bulk item preparation, go to www.clevelandheights.com/255/Large-Or-Bulk-Items.

HOLIDAY COLLECTION SCHEDULE

The collection schedule for the upcoming holiday is below. Please note that regardless of the conditions (bad weather, holidays), there is never a refuse collection on Sunday. Refuse collection is not affected by Independence Day on Sunday, July 4.

LABOR DAY

Monday, September 6 is Labor Day. There will be no Monday collection; all collection will be delayed by one day.

AUTOMATED TRASH COLLECTION IS COMING TO CLEVELAND HEIGHTS

The City is transitioning to automated refuse and recycling pickup this fall. **The targeted date to implement this new system is October 1.** The City is in the process of acquiring new automated trucks, tractor trailers, and carts for this new collection system. Carts will begin to be distributed later this summer. Each residential unit will be provided with a 96-gallon refuse cart and a 65-gallon recycling cart. Senior households will have an option to request a smaller size cart. Larger household will have the option to purchase an additional 96-gallon refuse cart. Recycling Reminder

The City will be implementing single-stream recycling collection on October 1. All acceptable material can be placed in the new recycling cart. Once the system is implemented, the City will no longer accept recycling material in blue or clear bags.

Technottrash

Safely recycle items that may contain personal information: old CDs, DVDs, diskettes, audio and videotapes, cell phones, pagers, PDAs, digital cameras, and rechargeable batteries. Residents wishing to recycle their unwanted items may bring them to the top of the ramp at the Transfer Station; the driveway is on Mayfield Road next to Foundation Honda. You may drop off items Monday through Friday, 7:00am to 3:30pm.



NOBLE GARDENERS' MARKET

Noble Gardeners' Market at Roanoke and Noble roads (Saturdays, 10:00am-12:00 noon) is an opportunity to sell fruit, vegetables, cut flowers and potted plants that were grown in the seller's home garden or in community gardens. Join us with your surplus! Sellers (and buyers) do not need to be Cleveland Heights residents, but may not be market farmers. Processed food is not permitted.



Sellers may commit to the entire market season or to just a few dates. They need to provide their own table or ground cloth to set up their "seller's stand" at the mini-park at the corner of Roanoke and Noble roads, one block north of Monticello. Sellers will need to make change for their customers so those buying also need to be mindful of that. The mini-park does not have water or electric utilities. SUMMER PROGRAMMING & MEALS

In collaboration with community partners and District educators, Cleveland Heights-University Heights is providing comprehensive and fun summer learning opportunities for students in preschool through 12th grade. The purpose of the CH-UH Summer Learning Program is to target critical academic skill building, support the health, wellness, and socialization of students and provide enrichment activities.

ROX MID ACADEMIC CHALLENGE TEAM GOES TO NATIONALS

Roxboro Middle School's Academic Challenge team competed for the first time in the virtual NAQT Middle School National Championship Tournament in May. Students managed multiple devices to buzz in electronically and be on camera for all events. The team finished the preliminary 10 rounds with a record of 4-4 (each team had 2 bye rounds).

Current team members are **Avery Craft** (Grade 7), **Leo Fasolo** (Grade 6), **Charlie Jolivette** (Grade 7), **Nora Lubbers** (Grade 7), and **Gabe Mallamad** (Grade 7). Mallamad ranked in 11th place overall, placing him in the top 2% of competitors.

MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS COMPETE IN STATE SPELLING BEE



Monticello 7th grader **Clara Walker** and Roxboro 6th grader **Adelina Szpak** competed in March at the Ohio Regional Spelling Bee. They were two out of about 60 school spelling bee champions that participated statewide. Their advisor, Beth Woodside, said the students "were given an enormous, dauntingly difficult list of words to study to prepare for the state bee, and both of our champs really rose to the occasion!"



SENIORS NAMED NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARSHIP FINALISTS

Heights High School seniors ('21) **Maple Buescher** and **Xavier Routh** are National Merit Scholarship Finalists.

The National Merit Scholarship Program is an annual academic competition for recognition and college undergraduate scholarships. Maple and Xavier qualified for the award because of their performances on the PSAT (Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test). They were named semifinalists in September.



Currently, more than 1.5 million students enter the National Merit Scholarship Program each year. Only about 16,000 students were named semifinalists in the program this year, representing less than 1 percent of the nation's high school graduating seniors.

HEIGHTS COMMUNITY COLLABORATES FOR GLOBAL YOUTH SERVICE DAY



Global Youth Service Day is the largest service event in the world dedicated to children and youth. Heights students from Oxford Elementary and Heights High, along with College Now Americorps and school staff, met in April to embellish and enhance the outdoor spaces at Oxford and Sunbeam Elementary School (a CMSD school).

Students and volunteers tidied up the outdoor areas by raking, pulling weeds, removing shrubs, laying mulch, picking up trash, and adding new soil in preparation for future flower gardens. The goal was to create spaces where students and families feel a sense of pride when stepping onto school grounds.

REACHING HEIGHTS

Reaching Heights is a non-profit organization that works to connect the entire community with the Cleveland Heights-University Heights City School District's students and staff with information, programs, and events. 

FUTUREHEIGHTS OFFERS COMMUNITY-BUILDING PROGRAMS

FutureHeights invites Cleveland Heights residents to participate in community-building programs this fall. The next Neighborhood Leadership Workshop Series begins September 19, and the fall 2021 deadline for Neighborhood Mini-Grants is September 15.

The programs, made possible through the support of the City of Cleveland Heights, the Cedars Legacy Fund, and the McGinity Family Foundation, and FutureHeights members, support residents as they develop leadership skills and initiate projects that add to the quality of life in the Heights.

The Neighborhood Leadership Workshop Series will take place on Sunday afternoons from 3 to 6 pm on a bi-weekly basis from September 19 to November 14. With the purpose of providing access to resources, knowledge, technical assistance, and support to community leaders, the five-session series will cover topics such as Researching Your Neighborhood, Asset-Based Community Development, and Understanding Cleveland Heights' Cultural History. Sessions will be held in-person in accordance with State of Ohio Covid-19 Responsible Safety Protocols.



Applications for the Neighborhood Leadership Workshop Series will open on July 15, and the deadline to apply is August 31. All Cleveland Heights residents are invited and encouraged to apply.



The deadline to apply for the FutureHeights Neighborhood Mini-Grants Program is September 15. Since 2015, the program has provided funding of up to \$1,000 to grassroots or neighborhood groups who have creative solutions, projects, or programs that build on and enhance existing assets in their neighborhoods. To date, the program has provided a total of \$36,838 to 57 projects in Cleveland Heights.

Funded projects range from gardening and beautification to community and social services. "Projects are driven by residents and neighborhood groups who know their neighborhoods' needs and assets intimately," said Deanna Bremer Fisher, FutureHeights executive director. "In 2021, we'd love to support more projects led by new voices, such as teens, young adults and those under 35."

Residents who have ideas for improving their neighborhood are invited to apply for a grant. The program is guided by a grant-making committee comprising of seven residents with a history of community involvement. The committee reviews and makes all grant decisions.

FutureHeights believes in the Assets-Based Community Development approach, which seeks to build upon a neighborhood's strengths. Its many activities include housing rehabilitation, neighborhood planning and creative place making. FutureHeights publishes the Heights Observer community newspaper and hosts the annual Heights Music Hop (see page 6).
